The last two months have been incredibly busy for the Soldiers of Gator Company. Following the elections, our attention turned to getting back to the basics, getting back out into sector and strengthening already established relationships and going to new areas to try to make friends. Gator Company conducted an Air Assault into the volatile Shuryak Valley, 2nd Platoon flew out to support one of our sister battalions in Nuristan, and 1st Platoon spent two weeks in the Korengal Valley to provide additional boots on the ground for Baker Company. One thing is for sure, when help is needed, the powers that be call for Gator Company. I am always impressed with their ability to do more with less and they are very flexible.

We've also got some new faces around Gator Company. 1LT Scott Klaas was called to Brigade Headquarters to assist the Engineer cell. I know it is sometimes confusing all the people moving around but it is understandable and family members back home sometimes get confused why this platoon is working with that company and where are they and who is in charge and whatnot. We started out the deployment with 1st Platoon Dagger attached to us but since the Platoon that was on Route Clearance (3rd Platoon Dagger) was due to be switched out, well, you know the rest. 3rd Platoon Dagger has been attached to Gator Company for the past month and is doing an outstanding job here, we are lucky to have them and it is likely that they will be with us for the remainder of the tour.

In the coming months, we will continue to do much of the same as what we've been doing. The main focus is on development, there is plenty of international fund organizations that have donated money for infrastructure development of Afghanistan. Although our main priority here is security of the people, we also get involved in this process, pushing the village elders and government officials to use systems designed to pave the way for eventual autonomous management. Much of the frustration your men endure is directed at the very slow pace at which this system works. Make no mistake, Gator Company has over 27 different projects running at the moment and much of our time is taken up by either implementing, managing, or protecting these projects.

We are almost halfway through the tour and the job hasn't gotten any easier. The 1SG and XO have worked tirelessly to get Gator Company more internet access and with luck should have it within the next month. New billets for 2nd Platoon have been submitted and look to start construction on them in the next two months. Yes, things move pretty slow here, including time!

Thanks again for all that you do for our Soldiers. A very special thanks to Kelley Granzow, she has sent packages and letters and has even put many Soldiers in Gator Company on a list to receive Christmas presents. In addition I would like to personally thank A 2-12 Association members Bill Comeau and Brigadier General (RET) Jim Bisson. They along with many others who have contacted me from this association, served in A 2-12 in Vietnam and are very interested to know what the Company is doing day to day here in Afghanistan.

Dear Friends and Families of 2nd Platoon,

As the platoon passes the fifth month of our deployment, we have been greeted with some salvation from the blistering Afghan heat. October's weather has been pleasantly cool, which has made our day-to-day operations more comfortable and bearable. It is amazing how much more acclimated the platoon is to the terrain and climate in our sector from when we first arrived. We are now able to move quicker and further across our sector with less physical strain or exertion. Willingly or not, many of us have become quite experienced rock climbers.

The past month has been a rewarding month for the Platoon. We have continued to interact with the local population in the Waygul Valley, focusing our attention on legitimizing the Afghan government and the development of infrastructure. Progress in Afghanistan takes patience, and sometimes it is easy to loose sight of your accomplishments. Even the pessimist cannot ignore the valuable impact that 2nd Platoon has had in the Waygul. Every time the platoon walks through a village in the Valley, we are confronted with thanks and praise from the local population. Soldiers returning from R&R are a source of encouragement and energy to a tired Platoon, which greatly increases our effectiveness.

I am happy to announce that several Soldiers in 2nd Platoon have been promoted since the last news letter. SSGs Rodriguez and Schroeder were promoted from Sergeant to Staff Sergeant in the beginning of the month. SGT French was promoted from Corporal to Sergeant and will undoubtedly perform excellently as a Non-Commissioned Officer. When the ANA found out about this, they asked for our help to remove the flag and show the peoples resistance to Taliban influence. Our platoon, along with the ANA, met with the local Afghan Police and village elders, and walked up the mountain to take down the flag. After walking all the way up to the top, we took down the flag, and on that same mountain we raised the flag of Afghanistan, to symbolize that the village stands for the government and does not tolerate Taliban fighters. There are pictures of this attached, and I hope it helps you all at home glean a better understanding of the kind of differences your soldiers are making here.

For Soldier of the Month this time around, I select SSG Faulk. As the Platoon's humanitarian aid representative, he has distributed aid to several hundred families in need of assistance to make ends meet. His work has been absolutely transformative in making our villages both safer and better places for the Afghans. Aside from just organizing and packaging the aid, he also coordinates the distribution with local Afghan authorities, which goes leaps and bounds towards putting the Afghan people further along in taking charge of their country.

We continue to appreciate everything you all do for us, and like I have said before, your support goes a very long way motivating us to get through the tough days walking the hills and making this place safe. Please accept my thanks for all of your efforts in helping make this Platoon successful.
